Mick Vande Berg, Ph.D., will kick-off this webinar series by briefly reviewing three different ways international educators have framed intercultural learning during the past hundred years. After identifying the nature of the evidence that has been used to support each of these frames—including findings from some of his own research on learning abroad—he will discuss several concrete applications of current theory and research in the intercultural teaching of students.

Learning outcomes: Participants in this webinar will be able to:

- Identify and discuss three different intercultural learning and teaching paradigms
- Identify and discuss some of the abundant evidence that supports constructivist assumptions about learning
- Frame intercultural learning and teaching around four core competencies
- Incorporate, in their own teaching, concrete processes and practices designed to support intercultural learning

About the presenter:

Dr. Michael Vande Berg, now Principal at MVB Associates, has held international education leadership positions at CIEE, Georgetown University, the School for International Training, Michigan State University, Kalamazoo College, and *el Instituto Internacional*. He has published extensively, including *Student Learning Abroad: What Our Students Are Learning, What They're Not, and What We Can Do About It* (Stylus, 2012). Director of several research studies, including the Georgetown Consortium Project, which explores the intercultural and second language learning of students enrolled in 61 programs abroad, he frequently provides intercultural training and coaching at universities in Canada, Europe, Latin America and the U.S. A senior faculty member of the Summer Institute for Intercultural Communication (SIIC), he is a founding Board member of the Forum on Education Abroad and a recipient of both the Forum's 2012 Peter A. Wollitzer Award and the 2014 IDI Intercultural Competence Award.

Bruce La Brack, Ph.D., played a key role in the creation of intercultural learning courses at the University of the Pacific, beginning in the 1970's. These courses, which are required of all students in Pacific's School of International Studies before and after studying abroad, frame the international experience with a focus on increasing students' intercultural awareness and enhancing their

skill to interact with people across cultural difference.

- Recognize how and why Pacific embedded intercultural preparation into all cross-cultural training courses and linked them conceptually

About the presenter:

Dr. Bruce La Brack, Professor Emeritus, School of International Studies, University of the Pacific, Stockton, California, created Pacific's innovative and integrated cross-cultural training programs to support international educational exchange. He is the primary author and editor of "What's Up With Culture?" (http://www2.pacific.edu/sis/culture/), a free Internet resource for preparing U.S. American study abroad students. An anthropologist by training, in 2012 he was presented the Teaching, Learning and Scholarship Award for Innovative Research and Scholarship in Internationalization by NAFSA: Association of International Educators. His numerous publications include two recent chapters in *Student Learning Abroad* (2012) and another in *International Higher Education's 'Scholar-Practitioners': Bridging 'Research' and 'Practice'* (2016).

Janet is also the director of the Master of Arts in Intercultural Relations, a limited-residency graduate program for professionals and other nontraditional students. She teaches short courses at Portland State University (USA), Aoyama Gakuin University (Japan), and University of the Danube (Austria). Janet has a particular interest in intercultural adaptation, transformative training design, leadership, and intercultural competence. Dr. Tara Harvey has been in the field of international/intercultural education for more than fifteen years. As the Academic Director of Intercultural Learning at CIEE, she developed intercultural initiatives for the organization's extensive study abroad offerings and trained staff around the world to facilitate students' intercultural learning while abroad. She is an intercultural consultant and trainer to the higher education field, Adjunct Faculty in Intercultural Competence at the Middlebury Institute for International Studies at Monterey, and Associate Faculty at the Summer Institute for Intercultural Communication (SIIC).
